It is our hope that the economy will begin to stabilize so we can project future costs that will be more manageable for the cooperative and our members and ensure a more stable future for your energy rates.



2022 Annual Meeting Minutes

The annual meeting of the members of Nobles Cooperative Electric (NCE) was held via a conference call at 7 p.m. on April 5, 2022. This was pursuant to notice duly published 15 days prior to the holding of the meeting, as required by NCE's Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws.

Ronald Schwartau, president of the board of directors, welcomed the members.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Schwartau, who presided. Director Timothy Bickett, acting as secretary in the absence of Secretary/Treasurer Cindy Hokeness, kept the minutes of the meeting.

The agenda and annual meeting notice were mailed to each member of the Cooperative. A motion was made, seconded, and carried to approve the agenda.

President Schwartau stated that the annual report had been provided to the membership prior to the annual meeting and constitutes the business and fiscal reports of the Cooperative.

The minutes of the last annual meeting of the members, as held April 6, 2021, were printed in the 2022 Annual Report. There being no corrections, additions, or deletions, a motion was made, seconded, and carried to approve the minutes as printed.

NCE's Bylaws state that a quorum is established when a question is submitted to a vote by mail and there are 50 or more mailed votes received on behalf of the Cooperative. Acting Secretary Bickett stated that before the April 6 Conference Call Annual Meeting, more than 50 mail-in ballots were received and a quorum was established as per Article II, Section 7 of the Bylaws.

Chairman Schwartau appointed Attorney Chad Felstul as parliamentarian for the meeting. Chad Felstul, attorney for the Cooperative, stated that the Notice of Annual Meeting was published in the Murray County Wheel-Herald and the Southwestern Peach for one week starting on March 14, 2022, and the Worthington Daily Globe on March 16, 2022, for one week starting on March 16, 2022.

The Notice of Annual Meeting was also in the Annual Report mailed to members on March 7. The balloting and voting procedures for the election of directors and nominating committee members were explained by Attorney Felstul. Ballots were mailed to 5,259 members on March 7 at their last known address as shown by the records of the Cooperative, proven by a Certificate of Mailing by Dairyland Power Cooperative. The ballots were sent to Pemberton Law, P.L.L.P. for counting.

District Five Director Cindy Hokeness and District One Nominating Committee Member Stacy Barstad ran unopposed and both were elected by acclamation.

Attorney Felstul announced the ballot totals, which were as follows:


There were 797 total ballots counted with 9 spoiled ballots.


There being no further business to come before the meeting, President Schwartau thanked the members for their participation in the conference call and the meeting was adjourned.


Create your MyMeter account
